## A Level Drama

### What is A Level Drama?

#### A Level Drama is about:

- Understanding the social, cultural and historical contexts of performance texts and how they have influenced the development of drama and theatre
- Understanding and learning the practices used in twenty-first century theatre making
- Experiencing a range of opportunities to create theatre, both published text-based and devised work
- Developing the ability to analyse theatre from the viewpoint of the director, actor, designer and audience member

#### Entry requirements: Grade 5 at GCSE

#### Year 12:

##### What will the course cover?

#### Component 1—Theatre Workshop

(20% of qualification) Performance and creative log

- ◆ Workshops exploring the strategies and working methods of historical and modern day theatre practitioners
- ◆ Research and practical exploration of play scripts both pre and post 1956
- ◆ Creation of a piece of theatre based on a reinterpretation of a text chosen by WJEC, using the methods of an influential practitioner

#### Year 13:

#### Component 2—Text in Action

(40% of qualification) Two performances and a written report

- ◆ Creation of a devised piece from a stimulus and an extract from a text in a contrasting style
- ◆ Process and evaluation written report

#### Component 3—Written Examination

(40% of qualification) Two and a half hour written exam

- ◆ Exploration of two different texts (post and pre 1956)
- ◆ Extract from 'The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time' to design for

### How is it assessed?

#### Exam board: WJEC Eduqas

In Component 1 students are assessed by the centre and marks are externally moderated.

Component 2 is assessed by a visiting examiner. Component 3 is a formal written exam, externally marked.

### What next?
